Editor's note on Pearl:

Pearl was one of our special needs Westies that found a chance for a forever family with Michelle and her family. Pearl came into rescue February 2, 2005, after spending her first 6 1/2 years as a breeding female in a west central Wisconsin puppy mill. Despite her hard beginning at life, Pearl came into rescue a sweet, friendly little Westie but with a host of health issues that had gone untreated including a chronic eye infection that led to glaucoma and her eventually losing that eye, a very large bladder stone and a rectal polyp that required surgery. Also Pearl needed a full dental work-up including having several teeth extracted, all of her vaccinations, and had to be spayed. WWR paid for all of her vet bills but Pearl paid for the lack of vet care in a reduction in the number of years she had with the Robinson family. Although her time with the Robinson family was a brief two years, Pearl left big paws to fill and it looks like Izzo is the perfect guy to fill those paws!

Ophelia Pearl (Opie) is a one-year-old female Westie who loves to play! She gets along well with other dogs and older children (10 and up), and is on her way to becoming completely house-trained. The previous owner had her “de-barked” – she does bark, but not very loudly. Her curly coat and one tipped ear give her a scruffy-but-cute look. Opie loves to run in the yard and spend time outside, so a fenced yard would be ideal. She knows the command “drop it”, but would benefit from an experienced dog owner who can work with her on basic obedience, such as sitting, staying and coming when called. She is spayed and up to date on shots, but requires “sensitive stomach” formula dog food to avoid digestive upset. And don't forget, you'll need lots and lots of dog toys! 2007 In Review

Rescue groups get mostly males, almost never get puppies and most dogs in rescue are over three years of age. Right? All those things used to be true but in 2007 WI Westie Rescue found our statistics turned on their ears. We had a total of 43 dogs in rescue in 2007. Of these, the males barely outnumbered the females (22 males to 21 females). A third were babies or adolescents (16 were under 1 year of age, 22 were between 1 and 5 years of age and 5 were over five years of age). Our oldest rescue in 2007 was 9 years old and she was adopted to her new home after less than two weeks in rescue.

Our youngest rescues were the 6 puppies born to Mia after she came into rescue. They were fostered until the adoptable age of 8 weeks. Six came to us as part of three bonded pairs. Forty were purebred Westies, three were Westie mixes. Nineteen of our rescues were turned in to us by their owners. Four were sent to us from Wisconsin or Minnesota shelters. Fourteen were retired from the breeding mills and 6 were born to us in rescue.

Reasons for owner turn-ins ranged widely: financial hardship, divorce, health of owner, health of Westie, military deployment, failure to get along with small children. Some Westies came to us with severe allergies or requiring expensive leg surgeries, others just needed a few

vaccinations or a good grooming. Some dogs came to us with many cherished possessions: toys, beds, blankies, and rhinestone collars. Others came to us with a rope around their necks. We welcomed them all and changed their lives one Westie at a time.

Fostering, transport, home visits, reference checks, telephone follow-up calls, picking up dogs at animal shelters or at homes of surrendering owners. Each Westie in rescue represents hours of volunteer time. Thank you all for the time, love, care, and money you invested in 43 wonderful dogs in 2007.

Is it A Puppy Mill or Reputable Breeder?

The term 'puppy mill' is in the news a lot lately but what does the term really mean? Many of us have a picture in our mind of what we think a puppy mill might be but is it an accurate picture?

Recently I attended a training seminar on effective lobbying techniques for pro-animal legislation put on by the Humane Society of the US. Everyone in attendance was 'pro-pet' although not everyone in attendance was there because of dog legislation issues. During the Q & A session following the presentation, one person in attendance asked the HS speaker 'what is a puppy mill'? She went on to say she had bought a puppy from a 'reputable breeder', but was appalled at the conditions of the facility her puppy came from. She went on to say how many other breeds this 'reputable breeder' dealt in (dozens), the way the dogs were housed (in a barn), and the condition of the puppy she bought (smelly). So how did this lady know the breeder was 'reputable'? The breeder told her so!

So is the question really what are puppy mills or is it what makes for a reputable breeder? If we better understand what a reputable breeder is, maybe we can better tell who the puppy mill people really are.

First of all, a reputable breeder specializes in one or two breeds of dogs, not dozens! They know the breed and not just how to whelp puppies. Secondly, a reputable breeder is happy to have you come and see their kennel and will proudly show you their dogs and talk 'Westie' at length! A reputable breeder will want to know YOU first before they place a puppy in your home. A reputable breeder knows the temperament of the breed and will help the family decide if the breed is right for them. Most reputable breeders require that you fill out an application before they approve of you as a home for one of their babies. Also, the reputable breeder will have you sign a spay/neuter contract before placing a puppy with a family. Does a pet store, an Amish farmer or a back yard breeder do this?

What do you get when you buy from a reputable breeder? A reputable breeder knows the health and genetic background of the dogs they breed. The puppies from a reputable breeder are not just cute, but pre-screened for health issues. A reputable breeder tests for genetic diseases that the AKC parent (Breed Club) recommends. Remember, a puppy being vet-checked is NOT the same thing as being pre-screened!

A reputable breeder won't offer to meet you at the 7-Eleven to sell you a puppy or hide from you when you have a question or concern about your dog! They will provide a full written health record for the puppy, and your puppy will be well-socialized before you bring him or her home. No breeder dealing with dozens (or more) breeds can possibly socialize all of those puppies!

You will probably have to wait for a puppy from a reputable breeder because they plan and pre-sell their puppies to approved homes. You will need to wait until the puppy is at least 8 weeks old before taking him home. If for some reason you cannot keep the dog, a reputable breeder takes back their dog because they care about what happens after the sale too. A reputable breeder's puppies are a labor of love for the breed and not just a 'sale'. These puppies matter to them!

Although most dog owners say they aren't looking for a show dog for a pet, reputable breeders often have champions in their lineage and pedigrees to back it up. When making a lifetime commitment with a puppy, it makes sense to know the dog comes from good stock and a part of that is knowing how her lineage "conforms to the standard" of the breed. This is done through AKC regulated events such as "conformation" Dog Shows. It takes a lot of money and is a labor of love of the breed.

Reputable breeders belong to their local or National AKC breed clubs, and while it's important to note that not all AKC registered dogs are all of good quality or approach the breed standard, red flags should go off for any dog that is not AKC registered. AKC papers do NOT guarantee a healthy dog. However, the AKC does regulate breeders and visits multiple litter kennels. They have rules and some of the larger puppy mills have been stripped of AKC privileges for noncompliance of these rules, hence the sudden rise of 'designer dogs' that skirt the AKC and have kept several mills in this state doing a brisk business. American Pet Registry (APR) and Continental Kennel Club (CKC) will send you a piece of paper for your dog which is meaningless.

Many of the dogs WWR has available for adoption probably originally came from a puppy mill since they don't have a reputable breeder wanting to take them back, but that does NOT make them

less adorable or less valuable to those of us who love them! My first Westie I bought almost 20 years ago came from a pet store in Eau Claire and had been born in Missouri!: home of some of the worst puppy mills! I hadn't even heard the term puppy mill until years after I bought Rosie! However, she was the light of my life and started my love of the breed. She died at age 12 from cancer, perhaps due to her 'poor breeding'. It's a shame she didn't live longer, but those 12 years were wonderful with my goofy little 'white devil'!

Currently I reside with 3 delightful Westie girls, the eldest I got from a friend from another state before I even heard of WWR, the 'middle child' comes from a reputable breeder (our own Lynn Sawyer), and the youngest is a WWR dog who according to her paperwork from her original owner, came from a Minnesota puppy mill. I love them all equally and wouldn't trade them for the world!

Why care about puppy mills if the dogs are all equally 'lovable'? The answer is simply these dogs are being bred without regard to their health, their parents' health or without regard to the terrible conditions they are living in. Whether the puppy mill is a large breeding facility, an Amish or Mennonite farm, or someone's back yard under the guise of being a 'hobby breeder', the bottom line for any mill is making money at the expense of the dogs. In the end, often these dogs pay for their beginnings in these mills with health issues that can show up at anytime in their lives. We love our dogs and they in turn love us unconditionally. We should care about where our dogs come from and how to make necessary changes to positively influence the health and well-being of those dogs living in mills. It matters for the health of the breed and the health of our finances to care for the dogs we live with. Being born in a windowless building, a barn, or a building 'out back', is no way to start a puppy's life, or to live your whole life as a breeding dog. Don't believe the people who do business this way and say that they are the 'reputable breeders'. Call them what they are: puppy millers.

Ham & Swiss Dog Biscuits

1 C Instant Oatmeal	1 Beaten Egg
1 C Hot Water	¾ C Corn meal
1 TBS Ham Soup base	2 ½ C Flour
1 TBS Sugar	1/3 C canola Oil
½ C Skim Milk	½ C Shredded Swiss Cheese

Dissolve the ham soup base in hot water, add the oatmeal and let soak for 5 minutes. Add sugar, oil, milk, egg, corn meal and cheese. Mix well. Add flour and turn out onto floured work surface. Knead dough and roll to about ½ inch thickness. Cut into shapes and bake 35-40 min @ 350 degrees. Can use whole wheat flour too. Yummy!!
